

A tale of two Bleriots

Gordon Hannah reports - I have always liked building models from the very early stages of aviation. This is for two reasons – there is a lot of 'build' and rigging etc and I am not very good at painting and these aircraft are usually plain!



So the Bleriot cross channel aircraft fits the spec. Various nice kits are on the market, but the most accurate model seems to be the Peanut scale plan by Emmanuel Fillon. So some time ago I set to and made the model above complete with the scale spoked wheels and 3 cylinder Anzani engine. Unsurprisingly it came out a bit heavy for a peanut scale but nevertheless did fly – sort of. Just a few seconds gave me some satisfaction.

On a visit to the RAF Museum at Hendon I came across a Bleriot XXV - a 'racer' developed from a 2 seater design with a distinctive 'fish tail' tailplane shown below.



This filled my criteria in that the paint scheme is a vivid yellow all over. I took some photos and Mike Smith (of scale matters fame) kindly sent me lots more pictures.

With no 3 view available I had to do a bit of guesswork. The wings and most of the fuselage seemed to be of the normal Bleriot set up – no real surprise here. This machine has a 7 cylinder rotary engine as opposed to the earlier Anzani, which caused quite a difference in the form of the front end of the fuselage. The undercarriage was significantly different too. So using Fillon's plan as a basis I was able to make up the layout for this model and it seems of have worked out quite nicely – but wouldn't pass any close inspection if ever (albeit unlikely) entered in a competition – those days are well past.



This picture is the result of someone treading on the original Bleriot when it landed near them. Please watch your step in the hall if a model hits you or lands close by!!

Easy Glider for sale





Rays forgotten model – DL5

You may recall that last months newsletter referenced an article from 1975 unearthed by reader Adrian Culf in Ontario, Canada. Ray Malmstrom had made a model of David Liveseys DL5 minimum aircraft.

Well Adrian and his friend John Cooper, a fellow Malmstrom enthusiast, have prepared plans and built a Peanut scale model of Ray's DL5. John tackled the fuselage and Adrian worked on the flying surfaces. Weight is currently at 10g





The model has now flown and Adrian reports back from Canada – Just finished an incredible flying session with the DL5. It's a fantastic flyer! We had Flair Phil Ray Malmstrom as the pilot. Power is a 9" loop of 3/32" FAI Tan II on a 4.75" Peck prop. True to Ray, we needed a fair bit of downthrust.

There was a lot of concern surrounding the large cockpit windscreen and how it might affect flight stability. If anything, it seems to enhance flying ability but I can't explain how!!
